

NORTHANGER ABBEY (1817) Jane Austen

The night was **stormy** and the rest of the family were already in their bedrooms.

Catherine crossed the hall and listened to the strong wind and **violent** rain outside the ancient abbey. She jumped with fright when the wind **bang**ed a door shut. She imagined all the **dreadful** situations and horrible scenes that were probably part of the ancient abbey's history. I'm sure Henry's stories about **ghosts**



When she opened her bedroom door, she saw a cheerful fire and was glad to be inside her warm room and not outside in the storm. Then she noticed the curtains were moving. As

15 she walked to the windows to make sure there wasn't a ghost behind them, she sang a little song to give her **courage**. She pulled back the curtains and looked behind them. 'Of course it was only the wind!' She noticed an old chest near the window, 'Now, Catherine, don't start imagining what's in that! Silly girl!'

She started to get ready for bed but she noticed a tall, black cupboard in the corner of the room. 'That can't possibly be the black cupboard Henry told me about in his ghost story!' Catherine picked up her candle and slowly walked towards the cupboard. 'It's black and old, just like the cupboard Henry described to me! What a coincidence!' Catherine saw the key was in the door and couldn't resist opening it to see what was inside. She could not sleep until she knew what was in that cupboard. She put her candle on the chair and her hand trembled as she tried to turn the key. The door didn't open, she tried again, but the door still

didn't open. Alarmed but not discouraged, she tried again. This time the key turned, but she still couldn't open the door. She stopped and listened to the sounds of the violent storm outside and she realised the awfulness of her situation: 'There are surely terrible things in that cupboard and I can't sleep until I know what they are!'
