NORTHANGER ABBEY (1817) Jane Austen

The weather was **stormy** that night and the rest of the family were already in their bedrooms. Catherine crossed the hall and listened to the strong wind and **heavy** rain

5 outside the ancient abbey. She **jump**ed with fright when the **wind** shut a door. She imagined all the terrible situations and horrible scenes that were probably part of the abbey's history. She was sure Henry's stories



10 about ghosts at the abbey were only jokes – or were they true? Catherine was happy to be at her friends' house. 'I'm perfectly safe in this house. Eleanor's room is very near mine so I mustn't be afraid', she thought as she went up the stairs.

When she opened her bedroom door, she saw a fire and was glad to be inside her warm room and not outside in the storm. Then she saw the curtains were moving. As she walked to

15 the windows to make sure there wasn't a ghost behind them, she sang a little song to herself. She pulled back the curtains and looked behind them. 'Of course it was only the wind!' She noticed an old box near the window, 'Now, Catherine, don't start to **imagine** what's in that! Silly girl!'

She started to get ready for bed but she noticed a tall, black cupboard in the corner of the 20 room. 'That can't possibly be the black cupboard Henry told me about in his ghost story!'

Catherine picked up her **candle** and slowly walked towards the cupboard. 'It's black and old, just like the cupboard Henry described to me! How strange!' Catherine saw the key was in the door and couldn't stop herself from opening it to see what was inside. She could not sleep until she knew what was in that cupboard. She put her candle on the chair and 25 her hand began to **shake** as she tried to turn the key. The door didn't open, she tried again,

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but the door still didn't open. She tried one more time. This time the key turned, but she still couldn't open the door. She stopped and listened to the **sounds** of the storm outside: 'There are surely horrible things in that cupboard and I can't sleep until I know what they are!' She was going to open it and look inside; nothing was going to stop her ...

DID YOU KNOW?

Gothic novels were very popular in Europe in the 18th and 19th centuries.

Northanger Abbey is an example of a gothic novel with its innocent young character (Catherine), an old building (Northanger Abbey), bad weather, ghosts and horror. Other gothic novels are Frankenstein, by Mary Shelley, Dracula by Bram Stoker and Wuthering Heights by Emily Brontë.
