GULLIVER'S TRAVELS (1726) Jonathan Swift

On the fifth of November, which was the beginning of summer in those parts, the weather being very hazy, the seamen **spied** a rock within half a cable's length of the ship; but the wind was so strong, that we were driven

- ⁵ directly upon it, and immediately split. Six of the crew, of whom I was one, having let down the boat into the sea, made a shift to get clear of the ship and the rock. We rowed, by my computation, about three leagues, till we were able to work no longer, being already spent with
- 10 labour, while we were in the ship. We, therefore, trusted ourselves to the mercy of the waves; and, in about half an hour, the boat was overset by a sudden flurry from the north. What became of my companions in the boat, as well as those who escaped on the rock, or were left in the

vessel, I cannot tell, but conclude they were all lost.
For my own part, I swam as fortune directed me, and was pushed forward by wind and tide. I often let my legs drop, and could feel no bottom; but, when I was almost gone, and able to struggle no longer, I found myself within
my depth; and, by this time, the storm was much abated.

The declivity was so small that I walked near a mile before I got to the shore, which I conjectured was about eight o'clock in the evening. I then advanced forward near half a mile, but could not discover any sign of houses or Lemuel Gulliver is a surgeon who works on ships. He has been travelling for six years when he decides to take one last job before going home. His last ship is the Antelope and they are in the East Indies when a violent storm comes.

- 25 inhabitants; at least, I was in so weak a condition, that I did not observe them. I was extremely tired, and with that, and the heat of the weather, I found myself much inclined to sleep. I lay down on the grass, which was very short and soft, where I slept sounder than ever I remembered to 30 have done in my life, and, as I reckoned, about nine hours;
- for, when I awaked, it was just daylight. I attempted to rise, but was not able to stir: for as I **happened to** lie on my back, I found my arms and legs were strongly fastened on each side to the ground; and my hair, which was long and
- 35 thick, tied down in the same manner. I likewise felt several slender ligatures across my body, from my arm-pits to my thighs. I could only look upwards, the sun began to grow hot, and the light offended my eyes.

I heard a confused noise about me; but, in the posture
I lay, could see nothing except the sky. In a little time, I felt something alive moving on my left leg, which, advancing gently forward over my breast, came almost up to my chin; when, bending my eyes downward, as much as I could, I perceived it to be a human creature, not six inches high,

45 with a bow and arrow in his hands, and a quiver at his back. In the meantime I felt at least forty more of the same kind (as I conjectured) following the first.

I was in the utmost **astonishment**, and roared so loud that they all ran back in a fright; and some of them, as I

- 50 was afterwards told, were hurt with the falls they got by leaping from my sides upon the ground. However, they soon returned, and one of them, who ventured so far as to get a full sight of my face, lifting up his hands and eyes by way of admiration, cried out in a shrill, but distinct voice
- 55 Hekinah degul! The others repeated the same words several times, but I then knew not what they meant.
